New Exhibits: LCAC Fall Festival and Valley Memorial Hospital

HISTORY CENTER

To help celebrate the LCAC Fall Festival, the week-end of Oct. 3rd and 4th, there is a special exhibit in the west room on the history of the Festival. This exhibit was organized and installed by Bev. Hamlin. There are numerous old photographs of Festival events of the past dating back to the days of miniskirts.

Also, opening on Sept 23, the date of the 20th anniversary of the dedication of Valley Memorial hospital, is a special exhibit on the history of the hospital. the first discussions on the possibility of building the hospital were held in 1958 and they were evidence of the town's sudden and rapid growth. The drive to raise the necessary funds was very successful after hard work and a modern well-equipped hospital was built. The exhibit shows details of the campaign - for example, a photo of Dr. Edward Teller at the controls of a tractor that turned the first bucketful of earth - and also pages from the scrapbooks of the Women's Auxiliary, an organization that has raised enormous amounts of money over the years for the support of the hospital.

Photo Archive

Bob Bronzan, Vice Principal of the Livermore High School has offered to help the Guild develop a photo archive that will be of great value for all future historians of the Livermore Valley. Based on the photofile, installed for us by Dan Mosier, Mr. Bronzan will make negatives and contact prints of every photo. We now have about 1000 photos.

Artifacts recovered from old Livermore dump site

In September, I recovered hundreds of artifacts from the Livermore historical site near the old Holdener Dairy. Saved from the bulldozer were such things as a "McKown & Mess Druggists, Livermore" bottle fragment, a "Livermore Soda Works" bottle, and " Peterson & Iverson Dairy, Livermore", bottle fragments.

Some of the artifacts are from pre-1900 times and some date to fairly recent years. Washing and preliminary examination and packaging of the artifacts has been completed.

developer who wants to rezone
the Stony Ridge/Ruby Hill property for housing and an office
complex. A good turnout of
Vineyard supporters is being
sought, and the date for the
meeting will be announced in
the papers in a week or so.

Some committee members and I have met with County Board Chairman Joe Bort and with the developer, Bo Rajkovski, who has the option to buy the land from Southern Pacific, but nothing concrete came from those meetings.

I feel that the decision on rezoning will finally be decided by the County Board, despite what the Pleasanton officials think of the plan, since the winery acreage is still under county jurisdiction.

HISTORICAL NEWS BRIEF:

"BLAMES RAILROAD FOR FAILURE OF AIRSHIP

Suit for \$50,000 damages was brought against the Western Pacific Railway Company last Saturday by the Toliver Aerial Navigation Company, which alleged that the collapse of the Toliver Airship while in course of construction at Verona was due to the Western Pacific. According to the complaint, the Western Pacific built a high embankment near the place where the airship was being constructed, and thus made it impossible for the Toliver Company to get on the ground a large quantity of steel and sulphuric acid, which was needed for the airship..." 



ASSESSMENT BOOKS


Livermore assessment books, 1887-1927, are a recent Guild acquistion. The books list property valuations, locations, landowners, and taxes accessed.

LATE BULLETIN: History Center Storm Damage, Oct. 28 - The Carnegie Building's leaking roof caused considerable damage to the History Center's photographic materials and artifacts. The LCAF exhibit materials were ruined. Walls are still wet. Ceiling covering material has fallen in side rooms. LAA has had some paintings damaged. Work on the Carnegie Building roof was completed in Sept. Some leaking still occurred after the first rains and LARPD was notified. The problem was supposed to be solved. The Center would have sustained more damage if it had not been for quick thinking and hard work by Barbara Bunshah. She was joined in her salvage efforts by Janet Newton and Bill O'Neal. Much material, including the Assessment Books, has been moved out of the Carnegie Building and the Center will be closed until repairs are completed.

HISTORY CENTER

The destructive deluge that poured into the interior of the Carnegie Building in October soaked the ceilings and walls of the two corner rooms (as well as the cupboards) but luckily did little damage to our historical records. But the interferance with the use of the rooms is complete as of this writing, although the tatters of the ceilings have been scraped off and the walls stripped. As soon as it is possible to cover the windows again and walk on the floors safely (nails are still protruding from the heavy carpet that had to be removed) we will begin to offer a short slide/sound show to our visitors. It will consist of 24 slides of early Livermore with a 20 minute tape accompaniment. We also have a 20 minute tape from the National Archives titled SOUNDS OF HISTORY that we will play for those who request it. This includes the voices of many famous people in Amican history.

We gave a 30 minute talk to Helen Phillip's group of gifted students recently at the East Avenue School. We are hoping they will accept our invitation to visit

the History Center.

The LAA will hold a Christmas Sale on Dec. 5, where the LHG will have cards, books and pamphlets on Livermore history for sale, as well as our new Calendar. You can help us preserve Livermore history by buying a few gifts at the Center. The old assessment books of the City of Livermore are a goldmine of information. Barbara Bunshah has begun a program of making an index card file of the entries. This will greatly aid researchers combing the books for a particular entry. If you would like to help with this, contact Barbara.

CARNEGIE BUILDING REPAIRS

The roof drainpipes have been unplugged and rainwater no longer leaks into the building. LARPD has removed the waterlogged rugs and pads, and is scraping the walls and ceilings to prepare them for repainting. When this is complete, new rugs similar to the those in the main room will be installed. We will ask LARPD to also install rugging in the History Center area of the main room. This will improve the appearance and help absorb sound. The rooms are now pretty well dried out and the musty odors have dissipated.

RESTORATION OF THE VETERAN'S MEMORIAL BUILDING

Many people would like to see the Veteran's Building returned to its former state. We all realise the great expense this would entail (possibly up to \$300,000, according to newspaper reports). This building is owned and self-insured by Alameda County. This means that there is no commercial fire insurance policy on the building and that there may be funds in the county treasury which should be used to repair the fire damage. If so, it is the duty of the county Supervisors to authorise repairs to be made expeditiously.

However, there are reasons to consider why the building should not be torn down, the lot sold, and the sale proceeds plus the insurance money be used to build a new Performing Arts building at the Civic Center. The main reason this should be done is that the city badly needs such a building because there is no suitable place for large-audience performances in or around Livermore. The new building should be dedicated to veterans of all past wars.

There are also good reasons to repair the existing building. Firstly, it is not legal or practical to use the fire insurance money, if any exists, for other purposes. Secondly, a new building would cost millions of dollars which would require a large fund-raising campaign during recessionary times. Thirdly, The 1931 vintage Veterans Building has an historical and architectural significance worthy of preservation. Fourthly, Livermore Veterans wish to preserve the building and have started a fund to which donations can be made.

My recommendation to the Heritage Guild is that we support the Veterans in obtaining funds for the repairs of the building. I would also recommend that when the building is repaired that the stage be rebuilt to a design which can accomodate a larger performance and that other changes be made to suit the needs of the supporting organizations. I urge all Livermore area organizations to support efforts to restore the building and to raise funds to help defray the costs. Organizations and their members should also write letters to the County Board of Supervisors and the County Administrator urging immediate authorization of money from the self-insurance fund to pay for repairs. The people of Livermore really need the use of the Veteran's Memorial Building and its unavailability is forcing rescheduling of educational, cultural and private events to inadequate facilities at greater expense.

We enjoyed talking to Mrs. Helen Phillip's sixth grade class at the East Ave School recently and were pleased to receive a copy of the class's new magazine DOLPHIN REVIEW. We quote Billy Duba and L. Clift's article CARNEGIE GHOST TOWN.

"A ghost town near Livermore? Yes it's the old Carnegie Brick town on

In about 1900, John and James Treadwell saw a perfect site for a brick factory. The site was located near the Tesla Coal Mine which had a lot of coal and clay in it. In 1901, the two men started construction on the brick factory. They completed construction of the factory in 1902.

The brick factory, owned by a San Francisco bank, was having trouble finding good workers so they hired some from Italy. The brick workers and their families built a town that had a population of 1,200. It had a bunkhouse, a hotel, a saloon, a residential section with four or five rooms to a house, but it had no city hall.

Besides producing bricks, the factory also made terracotta, decorative tiles used near the tops of some roofs.

After a while the bank that owned the brick factory went out of business and sold the factory to a brick company which, in order to keep up with competition, destroyed the brick works. Because there was no more work, the people abandoned Carnegie. Today, where the old brick factory used to be are just a few broken bricks that seem to say, "Here was Carnegie.""

CARNEGIE BUILDING REPAINTING

The West Room walls and ceiling have been scraped, the cracks filled and a prime coat of paint has been applied. PRESERVATION OF OLD LIVERMORE FIRE-TRUCKS

By the time you read this, the City will probably have turned over to the Guild the oldest Livermore fire-truck, a Ford Model T. This truck has been partially restored but is not fully assembled. The Guild hopes to complete the restoration in the future. This brings to three the number of fire-trucks the Guild is preserving. One of these, the 1944 Mack is often driven by Guild drivers and by Fire Department drivers in parades and demonstrations.

GUILD TO HOST FATHER ABELOE FOR TALK ON MISSION SAN JOSE

On Friday, Feb. 19, Fr. Abeloe, Pastor of Mission San Jose will present a slide show and discuss the history and restoration of the adobe Mission Church. This building was destroyed in the 1868 earthquake and was torn down and replaced by a wooden church. Robert Livermore's grave was recently revealed when the wooden church, St. Joseph's, was moved in preparation for construction of the replica of the adobe church. Fr. Abeloe has been given full time responsibility for the project, the last of the original California Mission Churches to be restored. We plan to hold the presentation, which will be open to the public, at the tasting room of the old Cresta Blanca winery on Arroyo Rd. past the V.A. Hospital. The final arrangments have not been completed, but if Wente Winery, the new owners of the property cannot open it to us, we will find another place to have the talk. Plan to bring a friend with you and listen to a very interesting and informative presentation on Bay Area history.

VETERAN'S MEMORIAL BUILDING

Efforts to rebuild the fire-damaged Veteran's Memorial Building have gotten off to a good start due to the efforts of George Mancuso who has raised \$10,000 from donations and sales. The Alameda County Supervisors expressed their desire to re build the building and work with grass-roots groups to attain this goal. Mancuso says he has not heard from the Supervisors or the City of Livermore regarding the VMB and is very disappointed.... The Guild has written letters to Supervisor Excell and to the County Administrator urging expeditious action towards repair-the building.


HISTORY CENTER Janet Newton, Curator

All of what is now the Livermore Valley once belonged to Mission San Jose and hence the one-time name of this valley, VALLE DE SAN JOSE. Most of our earliest rancho owners attended the Mission church. It was where they were married, where their children were baptised, and where they were buried. Until St. Raymond's church was established in Dublin, Mission San Jose was the nearest church. We are pleased that Father William N. Abeloe, curator of Mission San Jose, has consented to give us a talk about the important undertaking of the restoration of the adobe mission church. See the enclosed flyer for details of the meeting. We enjoyed a visit by Helen Phillip's 6th grade class from the East Ave school. Such visits make all our hard work worthwhile and we are looking forword to a a visit by a class from the Jackson Avenue School, arranged by Mrs. Givens.

NEW EXHIBIT IN THE WEST ROOM...by Chairman Bill O'Neal "URBAN ARTIFACTS FROM OLD LIVERMORE", is an exhibit of artifacts from a historical dumpsite which was located under the parking lot of the new Albertson's supermarket in downtown Livermore. The artifacts, consisting of broken dishware, pieces of glass, crumpled pots and pans, bones, leather scraps, etc, were salvaged by O'Neal during construction last fall. This site and another historical Livermore dumpsite are represented in the exhibit. Livermore pioneers used the sites to dispose of their trash. Their lifeways, ethnic origins, food preferences, medicine, skills, economic level, and other facets of their culture are partially seen in the trash they dumped.

FINAL REPAIRS TO RAIN DAMAGED CARNEGIE BUILDING...completed by LARPD The two corner rooms have been repainted, restored, and recarpeted and the center section of the main room has been newly carpeted. LARPD's Doug Bell and his men have done a very nice job of getting us back into first-rate condition. The LHG work crew are to be thanked for all the moving and repositioning of the furniture and equipment during this trying period.

EARLY LIVERMORE SLIDE SHOW...

We have a new publication, a booklet by Bill O'Neal titled THE ROBERT LIVERMORE ADOBE SITE. This gives the details of Bill's archeological work at the site of the Livermore Rancho. PRESENTATION ON THE RESTORATION OF MISSION SAN JOSE, by Father Abeloe... Our meeting with Father William Abeloe at St. Michael's parish hall was a big success. The excellent presentation gave us a history of the mission establishment and a history of the buildings, outlined the archeological work, showed pictures of the mission artifacts and gave details of the ongoing multi-million dollar restoration project. All of it is part of the history of the Livermore Valley, once lands of Mission San Jose.

A great deal of money will be needed to complete this project and anyone wishing to help should contact "The Committee for the Restoration of Mission San Jose, P.O. Box 3314, Mission San Jose, CA 94538."

After the talk, a bottle of special historical label, vintage Concannon wine, an antique Carnegie brick and a book on Mission San Jose were raffled off. The proceeds of \$50 will be used by the Guild towards preserving and telling the history of the Livermore area.

GIFTS AND DONATIONS TO THE GUILD...

The History Center has received gifts from LHG member Barbara Bunshah of subject indexes of the 1981 Tri-Valley Herald, the Independent and the Times, and the 1980 Herald. These are valuable references of hundreds of pages of alphabetized headings which took months of work to put together.

Guild Member Pat Dencer has donated a horse-drawn hay rake with wood crossbar and steel times, and a double-tree from her former ranch near Livermore. These are from this area and will be kept on display at the Duarte Garage.

Another gift to be housed in the Duarte Garage, donated by Guild member Ernest Gohler, is an old time gasoline engine and pump, once used to pump water in Livermore vineyards.

A boxfull of teaching materials, including old maps was donated by Mrs. Robert Craig.

The Valley Banjo Band has donated \$50 to be used as the Guild desires. This group performs old-time and current urban folk music. The banjos they play are authentic 1920's instruments. They charge \$50 to \$100 to perform at parties and dances, and donate the proceeds to worthy causes.

A memorial donation in the name of Keith Mintor was given to the Guild.

LORRAINE AND TOM RAISON HONORED BY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE...



We have a new exhibit in the West Room about the vineyards and wineries of the Livermore Valley, prepared by Janet Newton.

In the East Room we have an exhibit about the 25th anniversary of the Livermore Art Association.

We are very glad to accept Dan Mosier's gift of a slide-sound show about the Tesla coal mines. (Tesla was a coal-mining town in Corral Hollow in the hills east of Livermore.) Dan has incorporated music into his show and it is altogether enjoyable as well as instructive.

John Miller, who did such an outstanding exhibit last summer on the Liver-more Rodeo, plans to make a slide-sound show for the Guild on that subject.

A new booklet, A WALKING TOUR OF PRE-1910 ARCHITECTURE IN PLEASANTON, by Ann Doss, has been published by the ALVHS. The price is \$2 and it may be bought at the History Center or at the ALVHS museum in Pleasanton.

In March we enjoyed a visit from a class of 30 third-graders from Portola School under the direction of Mrs. Lewis. They toured our exhibits and saw some slides. Since teaching as well as preserving history are our primary objectives we are always glad to have students visit the History Center. We want them to realize that this is their Valley and that they are a part of its history.

Four LHG members attended the Annual Meeting of the California Historical Society in Monterey in March. One of their award winners who is a good friend of ours, Mrs. Amelie Elkington, advised us that she could give us several valuable references about a forthcoming LHG publication. It will be a reproduction of and comments on a rare document which has a reference to Robert Livermore. Mrs. Elkington's references will be included in the booklet.

ORAL HISTORY RESEARCH Pat Dencer, Chairman

Pat is requesting that two Guild members volunteer to interview long-time Livermore residents Virginia Fellingham and Elliot Dopking. Pat will coach you on how to do a taped oral history. It can be fun and rewarding to you and will help preserve the unwritten history of Livermore. Phone 447-8470.

HISTORICAL RESEARCH

Guild members Barbara Bunshah, Janet Newton, Bill O'Neal and Mal Sweet undertook a short research project on the "ghost town" of Altamont. In response to a request from Holman & Associates of San Francisco, an archeological firm, the Guild researched this 1868 village and vicinity for information on building locations and land uses. Mal Sweet and Altamont old-timer Lloyd Madsen went to the town and drew a map showing the few remaining structures and the locations of former buildings and a nearby quarry. Janet and Barbara and Bill turned up some historical references and Bill put together a report containing the material. The information is to be used by Holman to help plan a survey of the area for an Environmental Impact Report for a proposed windmill farm. Copies of the report can be obtained at the History Center at LHG copy cost of \$1.

FIRE ENGINE INSURANCE

The Guild has finally obtained the insurance the City of Livermore requires in the lease to us of the three antique fire engines. We obtained liability and comprehensive coverage on all three and the City is named as coinsured. The 1944 Mack, which has been so beautifully restored by the Guild, will be driven in the Livermore Rodeo Parade in June.

During the weekend of April 10 and 11, for the third time this season, we had a deluge of rain leaking through the roof into the West Exhibit Room. It was lucky there was not a fragile exhibit there at the time. The Old Livermore Urban Artifacts exhibit suffered only minor sign loss. The artifacts themselves have experienced rain and mud for 100 years and couldn't care less! However the Curator had just started setting up a new exhibit and some of the materials could have been destroyed. This was discouraging, to say the least, but on Monday morning LARPD workmen removed yet another collection of tar from the drainpipe. We hope this means that we are safe from another soaking. The walls and carpet

and ceiling were soaked but are gradually drying out. Originally, the Carnegie Building had a slate roof that was not a threat to the drainage system. Tar and gravel roofs are another matter, evidently.

Our Vineyard and Wine exhibit has been postponed until June. In spite of our troubles with the leaky roof, we had a class of students from Marilyn Ave School at the center. HISTORICAL RESEARCH ON OLD LIVERMORE HOMES Barbara Bunshah


The Guild's recent acquisition, the Livermore Assessment Roll books of 1887-1928 are providing valuable data for historical research. These books list the property owners' names, lot numbers, value, and tax assessed. Present day owners interested in tracing the history of their (old) houses usually have a modern address or possibly a lot or block number, and seek the names of previous owners. With the help of Henri Fankhauser, Peggy Concannon, and Carolyn Parrish I am indexing the Rolls by tract, block and lot. Using this index, we will be able to identify "the house at the corner of X and Y" streets as having been owned by Mr. Z in 1887, improved and sold to Mr. A in 1895 and a succession of others through 1928. To date, sorting of the index has been completed only through 1887 and 1889, and index cards have been completed through 1897-8. Sorting of these is under way. We hope to complete the project by the end of the year at which time the entire listing will be typed for readability and housed in a notebook for ease of use.







Historical notes collected recently: Regarding the old eucalyptus trees in the news last month, that the town of Livermore has decided to save, Malvern Sweet tells us that it was the habit of farmers, when they brought their milk cans into town to the creamery, to fill the cans with water so that they could water the trees on their way home.

Gohler, Sr., looking at the old Studebaker wagon now in the Duarte Garage, that we were told was used for hauling gravel: Ernie confirms that it was used for gravel and that the owner could make two trips a day delivering gravel with it for which he was paid \$4 per trip. And he had to supply his own horses, at least four.



WINE HISTORY EXHIBIT NOW OPEN AT THE HISTORY CENTER IN THE CARNEGIE BUILDING.

The reception and champagne tasting (courtesy of the Hank Schneiders and Stony Ridge Winery) for the Wine Exhibit was well attended and enjoyed by all. Janet Newton's exhibit of Livermore area vineyards and wine-making history is very nicely displayed. The exhibit will remain in place for several months and can be seen Wednesday through Sunday from noon to 4 PM. It contains old photographs, wine-bottles and labels, documents and other artifacts from the past.

URBAN ARTIFACT EXHIBIT AT ALAMEDA COUNTY FAIR

Bill O'Neal's exhibit of artifacts from a 100 year old Livermore dumpsite was displayed in the ALVHS museum for the fair. Hundreds of visitors viewed the exhibit with interest. The old porcelain enamel blue and white California license plate was dated at about 1913 by Frank W. Johnson of Danville.

The Guild's 1944 Mack Fire Truck was driven in the parade by Bill Junk. We didn't win a prize this time, though. For the Livermore Rodeo Parade we won a trophy for the entry and it can be seen at the History Center.

GUILD AWARDED BOTTLE OF COMMEMORATIVE WINE

The SAVE THE VINEYARDS committee presented the Guild one of the special bottles of Livermore Valley Chevrier bottled by Stony Ridge Winery at the Save the Vineyards victory celebration recently. The Guild was the first organization to officially sanction the drive to preserve the Ruby Hills vineyard land in vineyards. In this action, the Guild felt it was important that the County Supervisors not grant permits to develop the land into mini-vineyards or ranchettes because the development would probably not be economically viable as vineyards if subdivided. Subdivision would have destroyed the historic winemaking use of the land, and the 90 year old winery would have fallen into disuse. The winemaking and grapegrowing activities there and in the rest of this green and gold valley are a heritage from the past which is unique and highly appreciated by residents and tourists alike.

We are looking forward to restoration work on the winery which is now in architectural planning, according to Hank Schneider. Stony Ridge will be holding musical events at the winery later on this summer. Such events are very enjoyable as are wine tasting and picnics at other local wineries such as Wente and Concannon, both historical producers of special wines. These, the many other small wineries and winemaking hobbiests in the valley are carrying on the century old craft of wine that forms a very significant part of our local heritage.

A link with the past destroyed

Editor: It was a tragedy that the valley lost its last visible ties with Phoebe Apperson Hearst and her family with the unannounced demolition of Casa Bonita at Castlewood Country Club recently.

It seems incredible that this could have happened without prior notice, since we have three active historical societies in the area—the Amador-Livermore Valley Historical Society, the Dublin Historical Preservation Association and the Livermore Heritage Guild. Yet this is not the first time we have seen buildings of great historical significance destroyed.

Recall the loss of the Fallon House along Foothill Road several years ago when it was accidentally burned down in a firefighting exercise. Back in 1969, there was the horrible fire that consumed the ori-

ginal Castlewood. That was the greatest loss of all to the valley historically.

We can't do much about these past losses, but looking ahead, what will become of Kottinger barn, the Bernal adobe and Alviso adobe? Two of them are in deteriorating condition, and to my knowledge there is no active plan under way to preserve or restore any of them.

Will the newspapers kindly assist in researching their present and future status and keep a wachful eye on their progress or lack thereof?

It is sometimes difficult to keep volunteer organizations at a constant high level of activity, and when historically significant structures like Casa Bonita are able to "fall through the cracks" without warning, then it is time to regroup and be more diligent and alert to avoid future potential disasters.

I was told by skeptics in 1973 that the old Southern Paccific depot in Livermore was too far gone to be salvaged, and then again in 1981 it seemed too late to try and save the Ruby Hill/Stony Ridge vineyards. But both still remain today and appear to have a rosy future. So preeservation and restoration are possible even on buildings and places that seem unsalvageable.



GUILD CURATOR DISCUSSES GOOD OLD DAYS WITH EDYTHE WOODWARD

Three interviews were had by Janet Newton with Mrs. Edith Woodward who gave the Guild a large collection of artifacts recently. In chatting about old times, Janet remarked on the fact that very large parties were often held in what seemed to be houses that would not hold so many. Edythe said that they would be held in a barn, as they were in her birthplace in Colorado, where small prairie towns would hold dances in the railroad freight depot. These were not, of course, sanctioned by the railroad. So when a train was due to pass, all the lanterns were put out until it went by, and then were re-lighted. She didn't know if this ever happened in Livermore.
