Livermore had a novel social function this week, the likes of which was probably never known before. There has been in this community and probably others in recent years a revival of an old custom of giving a prospective bride a linen shower by which she will be provided with all the household and personal linen necessary to give her a complete outfit for her new home. The latest shower was complete in every respect except there was no bride, real or prospective.

It was not a case of desertion at the altar or anything of the sort and the queerest thing about it is that the recipient would not be a bride if she could, for according to rumor she has had many, many offers of matrimony in the past which she has declined in her gentle, kindly manner that has left her suitors still devoted if hopeless admirers and many a one of our substantial, middle-aged citizens will sigh when he reads this and murmur to himself that Emma Smith could have had that shower many years ago if his wishes had been considered and she had expressed a willingness.

Just why a shower should be given to Miss Emma Smith, the dainty little teacher who has had charge of the receiving grade of the local grammar school for lo these many years – we would not dare to say just how many – is not clear as the writer is not in the secret but it was the result of a challenge or wish or some other reason known to the fair perpetrators but suffice it to say it was given by about sixty of her lady friends who descended in a body upon her pleasant little home on L Street Wednesday evening laden with gifts of substantial table linen, bed linen and – everything imaginable that is made of linen. Some of the gifts were sent from the East and many from Oakland and other points where the little teacher has friends who had been included in the conspiracy.

Miss Smith entered heartily into the spirit of the affair and remarked that her friends could repeat that kind of a practical joke as often as they pleased as long as they did not require her to get married as a part of their plans.

A merry evening was passed and it is not likely that any who attended this pleasant affair will ever forget the shower that was given to the sprightly little lady who would not be a bride if she could.

### Pioneer Teacher Points Way to Community Reunion


No event of interest to Livermore Valley folks has ever been more successful or enjoyable than the reunion for former and present residents of the valley held in Oakland last Saturday afternoon according to the reports of those who attended.

It was one of those affairs which has a charm all its own, a feeling which can exist only where old friends meet, clasp hands, renew acquaintances and talk of the happy times of the past.

All honor for the success of the reunion to one of our best known Livermoreans of past years, Miss Emma Smith, pioneer teacher, who started several generations on the path of knowledge as receiving grade teacher at the Livermore grammar school. The event was originated, planned and carried out by her efforts. Knowing practically everyone who had lived in Livermore in the past half century, she got in touch by phone with all former Livermoreans of her acquaintance in the east bay cities. As she passed the word around she learned of others who were not on her list and they were invited. And thus the circle grew until nearly two hundred responded to the call. And Miss Smith was in the center of affairs, greeting everyone and seeing to it that none were overlooked, just as she had done for some of them when they started to school; yes, for the parents of some of those present.

The only drawback to a complete success was the absence of the present day Livermoreans. But this was due largely to lack of knowledge of just what was expected of local people; and regrets have been expressed all week by those who failed to attend with the promise to themselves and others equally disappointed that there will be no regrets next year.

Miss Smith has done something splended for Livermore, particularly in view of the fact that the event is to be held annually. The interest she has created will grow yearly and the Livermore reunion will soon become one of the red letter days of the year for this community.





She just kept nodding her head yes, and finally Isaid "OK, Iwill give it a try." I became Chairman about six years ago, following six years of Chairmanship by an outstanding predecessor, Larry Mauch. Thank goodness, Larry and his wife, Treva, are still very active in the Guild. Larry is on the board of directors and Treva does these newsletters. Because of its wonderful volunteers, the Guild just rolls along keeping the History Center open five days a week, the Duarte Garage/Lincoln Highway Museum open at least quarterly, and the "Historymobile" busy each spring with visits to third grade classes. A typical week finds our Curator, Barbara Bunshah, manning the History Center Thursday through Sunday and Muriel Dean starting the week off at the History Center on Wednesday. Don Meeker helps out every other Friday. We would love to have more assistance at the History Center. Bill Junk is the "chief mechanic" at the Duarte Garage/Lincoln Highway Museum on Portola Avenue. That means that he directs a corps of volunteers at the Garage. Jerry Bireley and I have been helping Bill with Garage improvements and we are really turning the corner on it becoming a true



The clutter is gone and we have improved the lighting so you can see the new displays better and we are moving old, stored Livermore newspapers from the Garage office to the History Center. We have hopes of the office becoming a real attraction in the Garage. Anna Siig has talked with Earl and Ida Duarte several times about the layout of the office of fifty years ago! We are hoping to replicate that layout. Recently we have had two open houses at the Garage while we hosted the Durant owners club and also the Mopar Alley club. The Garage was once a Durant dealership and that club was very excited about the opportunity to be in the Garage. Having old cars at the Garage never fails to bring out smiling visitors! I dropped by the Garage this past Saturday and found a crew working on our 1915 Model T Ford fire truck. It was teasing the mechanics with a few encouraging exhaust notes and I have no doubt that it will be purring in a week or two. We look forward to getting it painted and entered into next year's rodeo parade. At the Garage in March 2003 the Guild will be hosting the National Park Service western region meeting of stakeholders along the route of the Lincoln Highway! The Guild finds it very exciting as we become more involved in the activities along the Lincoln Highway.

November 1st was a very big day at the History Center. Beautiful new shelving was installed downstairs in the Harp

Room. Hooray! We look forward to storing many artifacts there. This will alleviate severe crowding in the upstairs west room. Let's see what else is going on. Gary Drummond continues to lead walking tours downtown and he and Anna Siig continue to serve as resources to the winery community. Vice-Chairman, Don Meeker, recently attended an association of museums conference in Portland, Oregon and he returned brimming with ideas for the Guild. He and others are formulating a policy on the details of sharing digitized images of our extensive photo collectoin. He is also spearheading efforts to obtain an assessment of our organization by the . We look forward to being a more efficient, smoother running Guild and possibly we will find it easier to obtain additional funding grants. Dick Lerche mans our popular website at www.lhg.org. Vanna Born is in charge of our oral history program and Tilly Calhoun leads the efforts to have the Historymobile visit local schools. 

Late in November the Guild sponsored a museum archives workshop conducted by Board member Maxine



## National Parks Service Presentation at the Duarte Garage/ Lincoln Highway Museum

In the year 2000 The National Park Service was directed by Congress to study the Lincoln Highway and determine the best way to preserve, commemorate, and interpret it as a unique piece of American heritage.

The Lincoln Highway team has spent a year studying the routes that make up the highway in more detail and documenting the road itself and the roadside architecture and attractions directly related to it.

On March 12th beginning at 10 a.m., the National Park Service will be giving a presentation about the resource study of the Lincoln Highway at the Duarte Garage, corner of L St. and Portola Ave.

The Lincoln Highway covered 3300 miles linking California and New York at a time when most roads were still unpaved, did not connect and were a little less than organized. The Duarte Garage was built in 1915 by F.H. Duarte to sell gas, oil products and also perform repairs on the old Lincoln Highway, the first transcontinental US Highway. When the highway was rerouted over the Martinez Bridge, the Livermore portion of the highway was renamed Portola Avenue. In 1923 the south half o the garage was added and became a showroom for Durant, Flint and Star automobiles. In the early 1940s the garage was converted into a machine shop for rebuilding machinery, particularly farming and winery equipment.


In the early 1970s the City of Livermore purchased the garage and surrounding land for use as a park. The Livermore Heritage Guild signed a lease in 1976 to restore and maintain the garage for use as a museum.

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

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The following Ordinance No.7 was approved by A.J. McLeod, President Board of Trustees Town of Livermore May 18, 1876

The Trustees of the Town of Livermore do ordain as follows: Any act committed in violation of the following provisions within the incorporate limits of the Town of Livermore, shall subject the person guilty thereof to a Fine or imprisonment or both fine and imprisonment as herein prescribed. Every person who within the incorporate limits of the Town of Livermore willfully or lewdly either exposes his person or the private parts thereof in any public place or in any place where there are other persons present to be annoved or offended thereby, or 2nd procures counsels or assists any person so to expose himself, or to take any part in any Model artist exhibition, or to make any other exhibition of himself to public view or to the view of any number of persons such as is offensive to decency or 3rd, who writes, composes, stereotypes, prints, publishes, sells, distrubites, keeps for sale, or exhibition, any obscene, or indecent writing of book or any obscene or indecent figure or 4th sings any lewd or obscene song, ballad or utters any lewd or obscene language on the streets in any place within said Town of Livermore where there are persons present to be annoved therby is guilty of a violaton of Section two of the ordinance and upon conviction of a plea of guilty thereof, shall be fined in the sum of twenty five dollars or imprisonment for twelve days.




GAS AGAIN JUMPS TWO CENTS

### HERITAGE GUILD HAPPENINGS Our Memories at Risk

All of our lives we have taken and treasured family photos. We have pictures of great grandpa with a beard and formal clothing staring sternly at us from perhaps one hundred years ago. We also have snapshots of first proms, new babies, beloved pets, and favorite cars. Today, we often take these photos with a digital camera or scan photos to send to family and friends over the Internet. But can we expect these new images to be available for our great grand children a hundred years from now? There are three important issues involved: hardware, software, and media. Consider a CD containing photographs, for example. The shiny disk that holds the photographs, the media, may last for five to ten years. If carefully stored, according to manufacturers, it may last many more years. But anecdotal evidence from professional photographers suggests some may fail in as little as a few months.

But whether the media lasts 12 months or 12 years in fact makes little difference. More to the point is the hardware and software.

A computer translates images into a code that is stored as files of numerical information. Computer professionals have created a number of different schemes to store the data most efficiently. Every day, new, improved software and hardware become available. This rapid rate of progress means that materials are soon outdated. Within a few years, our photo CD will be unreadable on the new equipment that we just bought.

Unfortunately, there are no easy solutions. We can print images that we want to keep, making sure that the ink and paper are going to last. We can copy our images onto more than one CD or DVD (or other media) so that we have backup in case one fails. We can make sure that the CD or DVD is stored carefully and not exposed to great heat or humidity. And we must be sure that we copy images to new media and software when we upgrade a system.

Perhaps in a few years, a good solution will be found. In the meantime, every photographer needs to be vigilant to protect his or her own valuable images.

- 1/2 Cup unsalted butter
- 2 Tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1/2 cup chopped carrots
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1/2 cup chopped onions
- 1/2 cup chopped mushrooms

1/4 cup Unbleached All -purpose flour
1 cup chicken stock
2 8 1/3 oz. Cans (drained weight) quartered artichoke
bottoms (juice reserved)
1/2 cup Chardonnay
1 Bay leaf

3/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon fresh ground pepper

1/2 teaspoon ground red pepper


1/4 teaspoon of each dried thyme, oregano and sage

pinch Hungarian Sweet paprika

1 cup whipping cream

Melt 2 tablespoons butter in large skillet over medium heat. Add carrots, celery, onions, and mushrooms and sauté until vegetables are soft and onion is translucent, about 15 minutes. Set aside. Melt remaining butter in large stock pot over low heat. Add flour and cook stirring constantly for 5 minutes. Stir in vegetables. Add stock or broth in slow steady stream, stirring constantly. Add artichoke bottoms, reserved juice, wine and seasonings, stir through. Increase heat to medium and simmer 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Beat cream in small bowl just until frothy. Blend in soup. Heat through do not boil. Adjust seasoning. Serve immediately. 4 Servings.


The tamale parlor, which was established about six weeks ago by two ladies from Stockton, closed this week for lack of patronage.

Interested in saving Tesla? The Carnegie Vehicular State Recreation Area is offering a two-day archaeology workshop at their district office at 15751 Tesla Road, on Saturday September 6 and Sunday September 7, 2003. This will be conducted by the California Archaeology Site Stewardship Program (CASSP) which trains volunteers to promote the protection of archaeological and historical resources through site monitoring. Volunteers, under the coordination of a professional archaeologist, make regular visits to known sites to monitor and report on their conditions. The site for this two-day program will be for the Tesla property, now owned by the Carnegie VSRA, where there has been increasing vandalisms of historic artifacts recently. The program will include a discussion of CASSP and what it takes to be a site steward, an overview of the region's prehistory, history, and natural resources, Native American perspectives, a review of the Archeaological Resource Protection Act and other laws, discussions and small-group role-playing exercises for dealing with the public, and planning of site stewardship assignments. Dan Mosier will give a presentation of the history of Tesla on Saturday and lead the walking tour at Tesla on Sunday. Lunch will be provided on Saturday. You must bring your own lunch for the Sunday prehistoric and historic site tours. At this year's Annual General Meeting, Marie Abbott will speak on Trevarno Road history. Here is a brief overview of the area's history.

Trevarno is a Welsh word meaning "The Head of the Valley". This very historic section of Livermore was named after the hometown of George Bickford of Cornwall, England. In 1913, The Coast Manufacturing and Supply Company (previously of Cornwall, England, Hartford, Connecticut and finally San Leandro in the Bay Area) built a new safety fuse manufacturing facility at this location just east of Livermore. The Company also built its own private street at the site, complete with a median lined with walnut trees. They constructed a two-story brick building for its headquarters and 13 homes for its officers. Most of them were modest bungalow-style Craftsman houses, but Tom Norris, president of Coast from 1915 to 1946, lived in a larger Mission Revival style home, which today still stands at the corner of First Street and Trevarno Road. At the time that it was built, it was known as the largest home in the Livermore Valley. The Rose Cottage was the vice president's home and was across the street from the president's house. In 1968, Coast Manufacturing merged with Hexcel, who relocated its operations across the railroad tracks. In 1976, Hexcel sold the other 12 company homes to a local developer who renamed the area Trevarno Estates and resold the houses to individual homeowners.

comfort of your own home. Recently over 200 historical photos from the Guild's collection were put on display on the internet at www.eLivermore.com, along with descriptions and history. These include aerial photos from as far back as 1928, the Flagpole dedication, the changing face of First Street, hotels, wineries, many businesses, Ravenswood, railroads, the brick factory, and much more. Two of the aerial photos have streets and buildings labeled. There are also a number of new photos from the same angle as the historical photos which provides a "then and now" view. This is part of a pilot project to digitize the photo collection. So far over 500 photos have been scanned. The high resolution digitized photos will be put on CDs for the Guild's use. The CDs will provide a backup to the original photos in case disaster strikes. They will also allow easier access to the photos.
